Foundations for change — Homelessness in NSW



The Issue

Homelessness is often a symptom of other social problems like poverty, unemployment and shortages of affordable housing. People are at a higher risk of homelessness when several issues intersect, such as domestic and family violence, trauma, mental illness, drug and alcohol problems and financial stresses.

On Census night in 2011, there were:


28,192

people who were homeless in NSW around —

1 in 250 g

This represents an **increase of 20%** from the 2006 Census.

Primary reasons given by people for seeking help from specialist homelessness services:



Addressing the challenges

The NSW Government is serious about tackling homelessness. In 2016-17 the Government will spend \$188 million on specialist homelessness services that will respond to around 58,000 people who are homeless or at risk of homelessness.

Effective action on homelessness relies on all government and community organisations working together across prevention, early intervention and crisis responses.



Targeted action by government can impact homelessness

 especially by identifying risks and addressing the underlying causes of homelessness.



We know that when we respond quickly we can often help families and individuals avoid homelessness.



Specialist homelessness services are already making a difference integrating crisis-driven responses and early intervention to prevent homelessness.



Future Directions for Social Housing in NSW will increase the supply of social and affordable housing and provide further investment in private rental products and support for people to access education and employment opportunities.



The NSW Government has released a discussion paper: Foundations for Change — Homelessness in NSW.

It aims to engage a wide range of organisations and individuals to strengthen collective action and develop a new strategy for reducing homelessness.

The new homelessness strategy will bring a much stronger focus to the prevention of homelessness, not just managing it. The strategy will create a framework for collective action across all levels of government, non-government sectors and the community to ensure:

fewer people experience homelessness



people in NSW find secure places to live



people are empowered to tackle the issues that put them at risk of homelessness
