Introduction


This communications toolkit is intended to provide individuals and organisations with access to materials that can be used to help spread the word about SkillsLink2Work across a range of communication channels including websites, intranets, social media platforms and electronic and printed newsletters.

We would be grateful for your help in promoting SkillsLink2Work to ensure carers understand how the skills, knowledge and experience they have built up as carers can be used to gain employment.

About SkillsLink2Work

SkillsLink2Work helps carers describe their daily activities in ways that can be used in job applications or in getting recognition for training. The interactive website encourages carers to consider a wide range of professions, not only paid carer roles.

SkillsLink2Work asks carers to identify the tasks they complete as a carer. SkillsLink2Work then produces two reports of their skills: a short version that can be attached or incorporated into a resume and a longer version that can be used as a prompt when applying for jobs or preparing for an interview.



Who is the audience?

SkillsLink2Work is a resource specifically designed for carers. With 857,000 carers in NSW we want to ensure we are communicating how this resource can help them.

Carers provide ongoing unpaid support to people who need it because of their disability, chronic illness, mental ill-health, dementia or frail age.

In addition to targeting carers directly, it is also important that people who come into contact with carers are aware of SkillsLink2Work and can recommend it.

Examples include:

- Family and friends
- Organisations that provide support services for carers e.g. carer support and respite services
- Organisations that provide services to people who need care e.g. hospitals, GPs, disability service providers.
- Organisations that provide employment services, education and training.
- Employees of community organisations and government departments.

Newsletter

A new website will help carers understand how they can use the skills they have gained from caring for a loved one to re-enter the paid workforce.

Assistant Minister for Disability Services Jane Prentice and NSW Minister for Ageing and Disability Services John Ajaka launched the SkillsLink2Work website and toolkit on Friday 29 April 2016. The website helps carers recognise that their skills are valuable in the paid workforce.

The SkillsLink2Work website takes the difficulty out of identifying carers' employable skills so they can combine caring with paid work or return to work when caring ends. Developing a tool to recognise carers skills was identified as a commitment under the NSW Carers Strategy – a five year plan to improve the position of carers in NSW.

SkillsLink2Work is the result of a partnership between the Commonwealth Government Department of Social Services and the NSW Government Department of Family and Community Services. Its development was lead by the NSW Community Services and Health Industry Training Advisory Body (NSW ITAB) in consultation with carers.





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
