## **TFM Family Investment model**



### How to interpret this information pack

Page 2
presents a snapshot of information for the

New England FACS district coming out of TFM's Investment model.

The information is disaggregated by three groups of vulnerable children and young people born in the

#### New England:

- Young children aged 0 to 5
- Children aged under 15 and affected by mental illness
- Children and young people aged 15 to 18 and affected by mental illness.

The final column on page 2 presents the proportion of the vulnerable children in each group who have experienced each of five indicators strongly associated with poorer outcomes in later life.

Page 3 presents the projected outcomes for New England

children and young people in each vulnerable group, by the number of indicators they have experienced which are associated with poorer outcomes later in life. The projected outcomes are compared against the average across all NSW children and young people in the same age bracket and expressed as a multiplier (e.g. 1.5x).


Page 3 also presents outcomes for all children and young people classed as vulnerable in **New England** — shaded in blue.

These indicators differ depending on the vulnerable group, however the consistent finding is that the more vulnerable indicators a child has experience with, the more they are expected to interact with the criminal justice system, social housing, child protection and mental health services.

Page 4

looks at vulnerable groups in the LGA/s of the New England. It shows, for each vulnerable group: the number of children and young people in the relevant age bracket, the number in the vulnerable group, the proportion (%) of children and young people classed as vulnerable, and the proportion (%) of children and young people in the vulnerable group who identify as Aboriginal.

## Key insights for vulnerable young children aged 0 to 5 in New England

- 2<sup>nd</sup> highest out of 16 in estimated future cost to NSW government.
- 37% of children aged 0 to 5 belong to this vulnerable group (4<sup>th</sup> highest out of 16 FACS districts).
- Projected outcomes for the vulnerable group are worse than the NSW average for this group, e.g. 49% of the vulnerable group are expected to have a ROSH report in the future compared to the NSW average of 34% for this group.

## Key insights for children aged under 15 and affected by mental illness in New England

- 3<sup>rd</sup> highest out of 16 in estimated future cost to NSW government
- 16% of children aged under 15 belong to this vulnerable group (5<sup>th</sup> highest out of 16 FACS districts).
- Projected outcomes for the vulnerable group are worse than the NSW average for this group, e.g. 41% of the vulnerable group are expected to complete the HSC in NSW compared to the NSW average of 53% for this group.

# Key insights for children and young people aged 15 to 18 and affected by mental health in New England

- 2<sup>nd</sup> highest out of 16 in estimated future cost to NSW government
- 20% of children and young people aged 15 to 18 belong to this vulnerable group (4<sup>th</sup> highest out of 16 FACS districts).
- Projected outcomes for the vulnerable group are generally worse than the NSW average for this group, e.g. 31% of the vulnerable group are expected to interact with the justice system in the future compared to the NSW average of 25% for this group.

We look at these groups of vulnerable children and young people born in the FACS District of New England

We have identified, for each vulnerable group, five indicators associated with these children having high service usage and poorer outcomes later in life

#### Young children (0 to 5)

Children aged 5 or younger at 30 June 2017 with one or more of the following:

- 1 or more parental risk factors
- 2 or more perinatal risk factors
- Assessment as ROSH+

There are **5,795** children in New England in the vulnerable young children group.

On average, these C/YP are estimated to cost the NSW govt \$157k each for the key human services they use up to age 40



This is **3.9**X the average cost for all NSW C/YP aged 15-18
